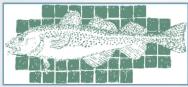

Gulf shrimp in trouble

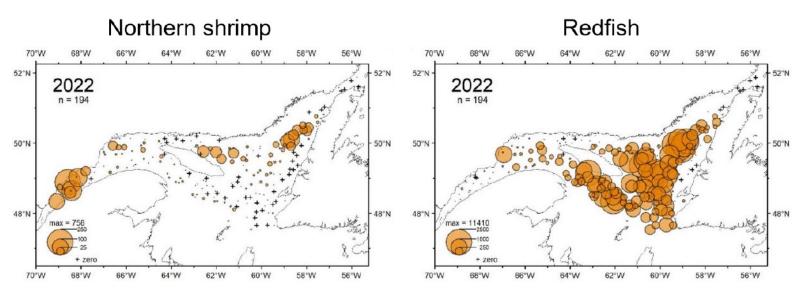


Figure 12. Distribution of northern shrimp and redfish catch rates (kg/15 minutes tow) in the August 2022 DFO survey in the Estuary and northern Gulf of St. Lawrence.



Survey shows changes since 2015

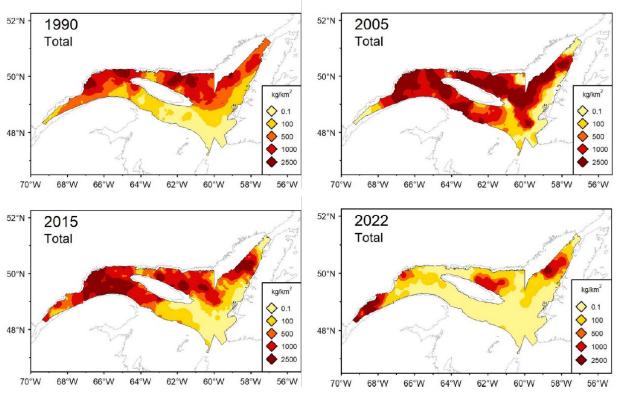


Figure 5. Northern shrimp biomass (kg/km²) distribution in the DFO survey obtained by kriging for 1990, 2005, 2015, and 2022.



2024 could see some fishery closures

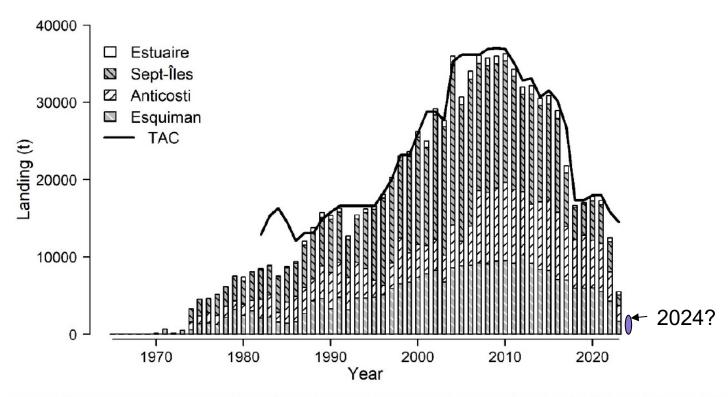


Figure 2. Annual landing per assessment unit and total allowable catches (TAC). The 2022 and 2023 data are preliminary as of October 15.



Science recommendation after survey for 2024

Even with most aggressive quota will not be higher than 2587 tons and is likely to be lower, even if the fishery opens in all areas.

In 2023 only 38% of the quota was landed for 5,505 tons

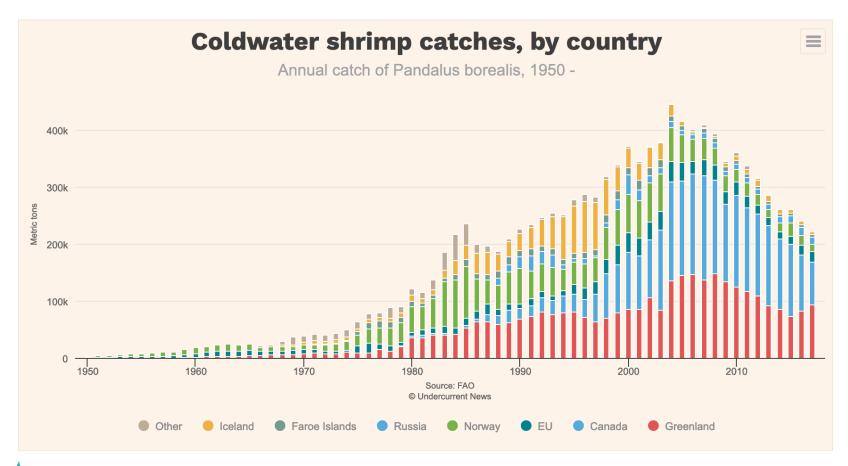


In 2024 the shrimp contraction will continue

- Lack of product means that much of the fishery will have to adjust, and plants that in the past produced cooked and peeled shrimp will have to source elsewhere or curtail operations.
- The rest of our discussion is on markets adjusting to the changes in where cooked and peeled shrimp is coming from.



Trend of falling P. borealis coldwater shrimp volumes continuing





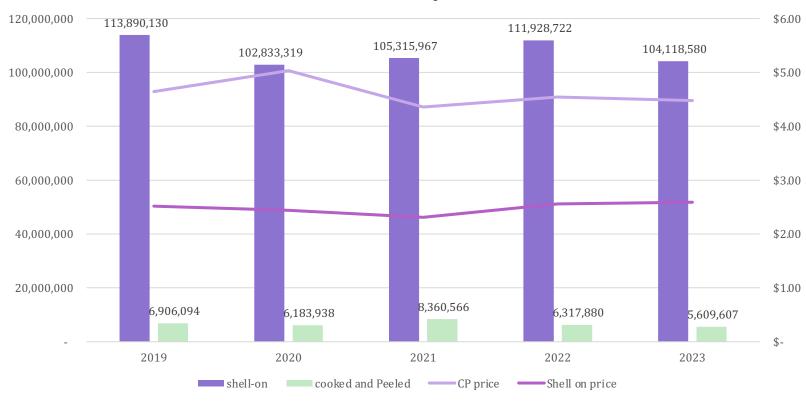
Greenland, largest producer is reducing TAC





Offshore shell on shrimp dominates Canadian exports

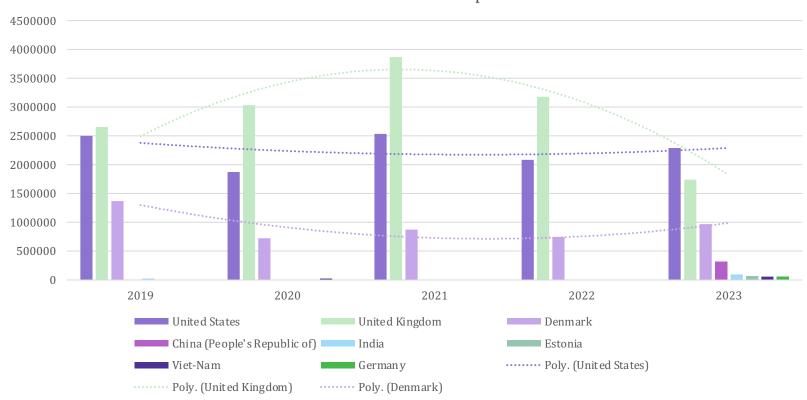
Canadian Exports





Canadian Cooked and Peeled Exports

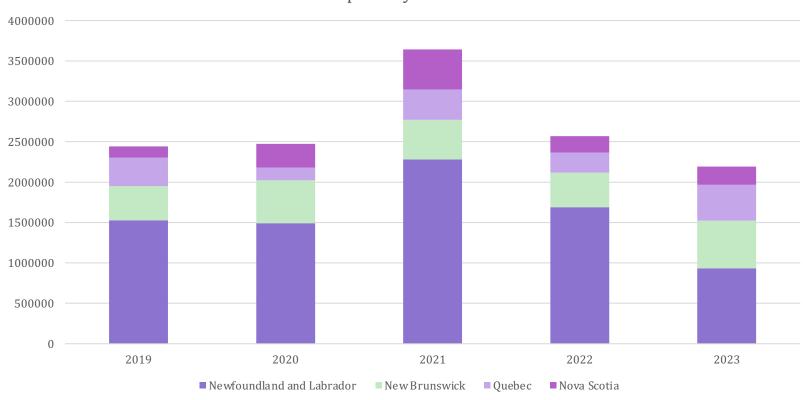

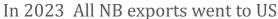

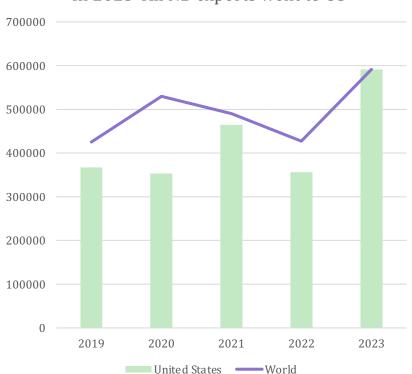

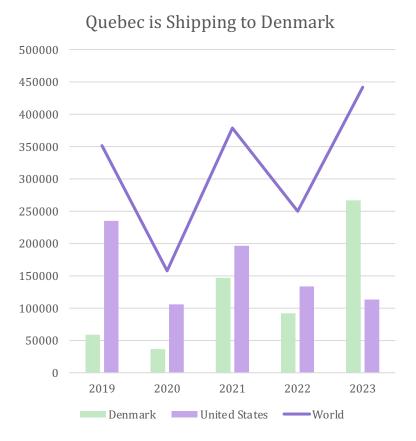

Canada supplied virtually all P. Borealis to US in 2022, 23



- The US had negligible imports from Norway or Greenland.
- NB and QB are primary sources for US coldwater.



West coast coldwater shrimp

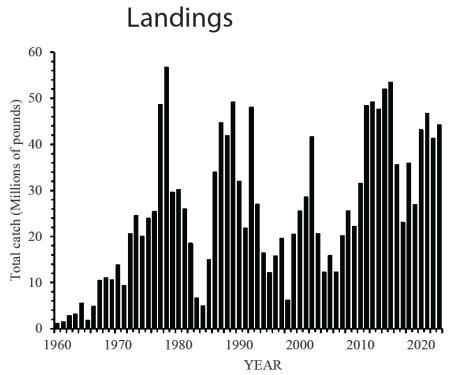


Figure 1. Landings of pink shrimp into Oregon by year: 1957-2023.

Oregon had excellent season last year:
-volume up to 44.1 million lbs.
-2 and 3 year old shrimp meant good catch rates and larger size.



Oregon saw larger shrimp with mean count 127/lb

Weight of Shrimp by Age

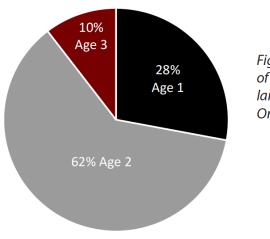


Figure 15. Weight of pink shrimp, landed into Oregon, 2023.

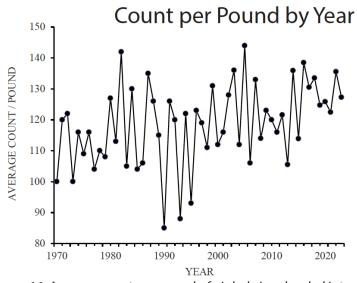


Figure 16. Average count per pound of pink shrimp landed into Oregon, by year: 1970-2023.



Vessel prices (\$0.42 lb) lowest since 2010

- Vessel prices for West Coast shrimp continued to fall.
- Shrimp were larger, but prices still were lower
- Third year prices have declined
- Indication of weak overall market for shrimp on West coast.
- Likely due to competition from low cost sales of warm water cooked and peeled
- Also, though average size was larger, there were a lot more smaller 500-800 size shrimp.

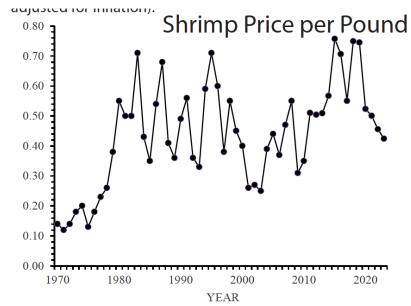


Figure 13. Average ex-vessel price-per-pound of pink shrimp landed into Oregon, by year: 1970-2023.



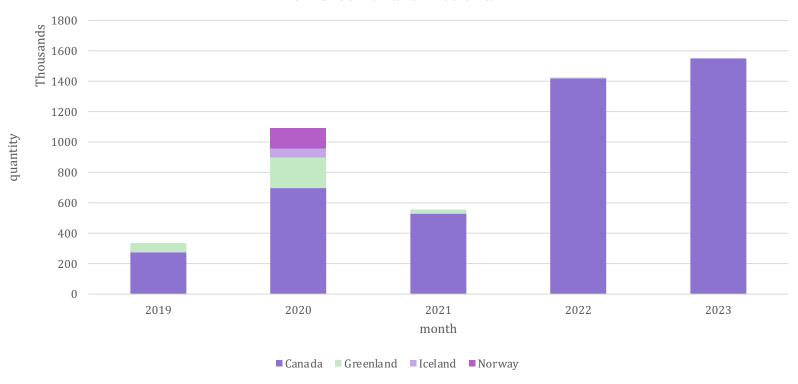
Forecast is for lower harvest in 25-30 million lb range

- 2021 year class: some 3 year olds will be in 2024 fishery, at large sizes
- 2022 class had good recruitment, but only showed up at 50% of expectations. Should be plentiful in 2024, but at lower levels.
- 2023 year class: poor recruitment.
- Upshot is that overall volume will fall.



US Coldwater shrimp imports increased, all from Canada

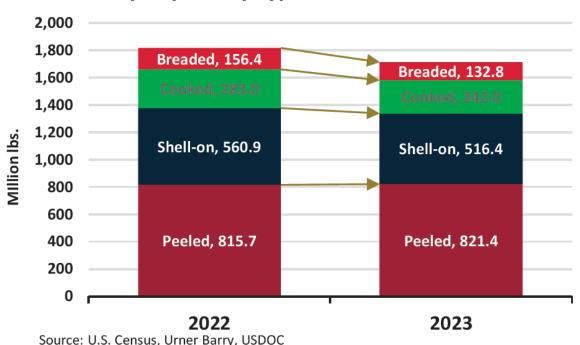

YTD Shrimp Imports by Type Breakdown

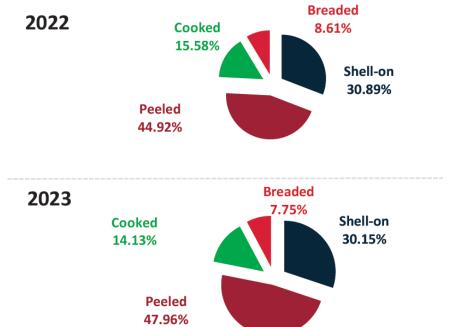


Overall imports declined with all categories down except for peeled shrimp.



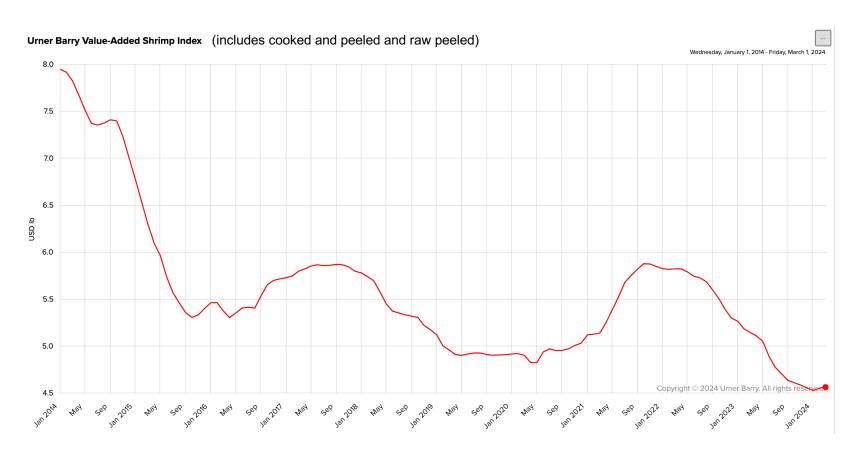
Prices have continued to decrease

- Prices for warm water shrimp at historic lows.
- Peeled category only category with increase over 2022.





Cooked and peeled shrimp index at lowest point in ten years





Economic headwinds still hurting shrimp sales

- Both retail and foodservice sectors facing extreme resistance to higher prices.
- Further, an extended period of low prices for warm water shrimp has not increased volumes.
- In this environment, higher prices lead directly to contraction in consumption.



Retail sales of fresh and frozen shrimp declining

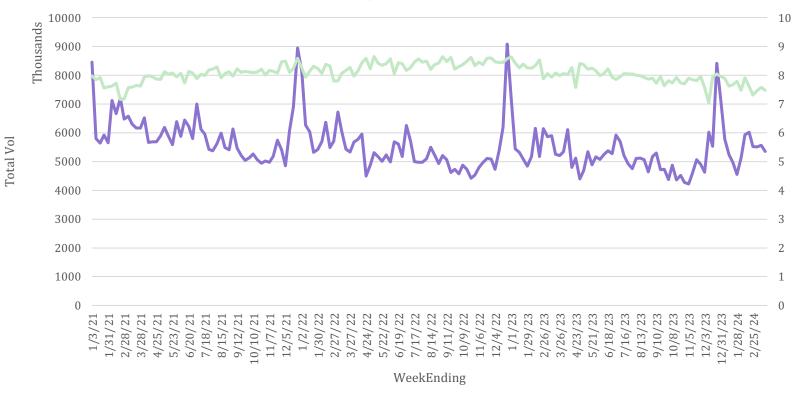

Depleted savings after building up a reserve early on in the pandemic



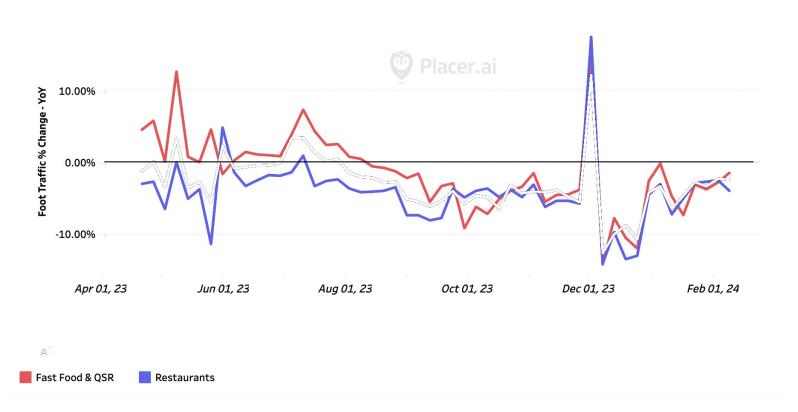

Food costs are biggest concern of restaurant operators



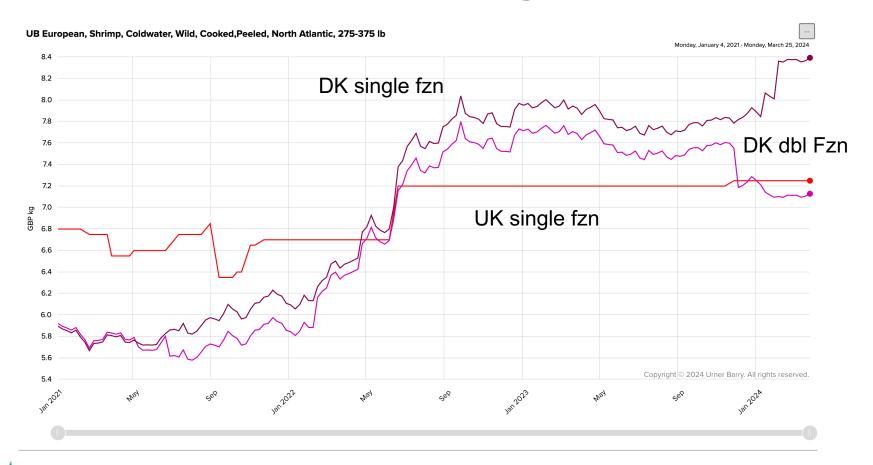


Reduction in Quota for Gulf means less P. Borealis for US

- In the past two years virtually all P. Borealis in US has come from NL and NB.
- With a big cut, or even moratorium on some fishing areas, total volume will decline.
- CWP volume also declining in Norway and Greenland
- Prices could go up for those customers still wanting Pandalus Borealis

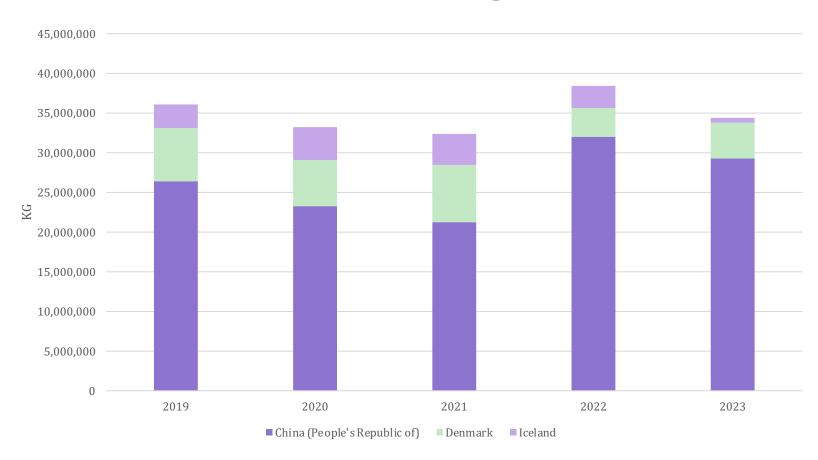


Danish single fzn prices increasing

2024 Issues

- Elephant in the room is reduction in shrimp quota. There may not be much shrimp to catch.
- The reduction will lead to a dislocation in US market for P. borealis. West coast P. jordani supply will be lower also.
- Change in supply should put upward pressure on coldwater prices in US, despite weak overall shrimp market.



Other regions also seeing lower catches

- When inshore reductions took hold in Newfoundland, some companies began producing twice frozen using offshore industria shrimp.
- In 2023 Denmark increased its purchase of CA offshore shrimp. Some of that may be going to a 2X fzn market.
- Iceland has usually imported shrimp to product 2x fzn for UK market



2024 Outlook

Positive

- Lower availability will likely be compensated with price increases.
- Other areas (West Coast, Greenland) also seeing reductions, so not just in the Gulf.

Negative

- With no shrimp to fish price doesn't matter.
- Overall weak market means that it is harder for coldwater shrimp to maintain its price premium in US.
- Price differential will push some users to switch out of category.
- Disconnect between shell-on prices to China and C&P prices in Europe
