TWO OPTIONS IF YOU DO NOT HAVE YOUR HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA

Adult High School Diploma

- Did you leave school without your high school diploma?
- Have you continued your studies since leaving school?
- Have you completed apprenticeship training, community college or university courses, or workplace training?
- Do you sometimes wish you could apply now for your high school diploma?

General Education Development (GED) – Certification

- Did you leave school without your high school diploma?
- Are you at least nineteen years of age?
- Are you no longer enrolled in public school?

If you answer yes to <u>all</u> of these questions, the <u>General Educational Development (GED) program</u> might be for you. The GED program is a series of five tests in the core high school curriculum areas of Language Arts-Writing, Language Arts-Reading, Social Studies, Science and Mathematics. Those who successfully complete all five tests will be awarded a GED High School Equivalency Diploma.
